It has been a wet and difficult summer for most of us in Schuylkill County and beyond. Record rainfall has impacted almost every aspect of our lives. Many streams came over their banks and directly into our homes, businesses, infrastructure, and more.

In our line of work at the Conservation District, we focus on streams every day. We monitor streams for water quality. We work diligently to prevent pollution and sediment from entering them. We educate about their importance, inhabitants, and impacts.

Since 2011, we have also gotten involved in flood mitigation, recovery, and resiliency efforts. We are very excited to have floodplain restoration projects underway or upcoming in the Swatara Creek watershed. These projects are designed to give the stream a place to enter its floodplain, spreading water out and slowing it down before entering our communities.

But these are just pieces in the large, complex puzzle that is flood mitigation. In the coming months, we plan to offer stream maintenance and flood intervention training to teach ways to work with the natural behavior of streams. Ignoring this behavior has been proven to worsen damage and create new problems in future flooding events. We are also involved in a countywide conversation to help all of our communities in long-term flood recovery efforts.

We continue to work with streams every day and encourage you to get involved in any way you are able. If you're not sure where to begin, please contact us!

Cindy Ross began her adventuring life as a Triple Crown Hiker, accomplishing the Appalachian Trail, Pacific Crest, and Continental Divide Trails. Along with her husband Todd Gladfelter, they led their young children, Sierra and Bryce, 3,100 miles across the Rocky Mountain wilderness on the backs of llamas, Cindy discovered how experiences can generate extraordinary learning. She created a whole new way of nurturing and supplementing her children's education, focusing on two major arenas for learning: The Natural World and Travel.

The result is Cindy's 7th published book: *The World is Our Classroom- How one family used nature & travel to shape an extraordinary education-* Skyhorse Publishing, NYC. Cindy orchestrated learning opportunities as the family traveled the world, moving about on foot and bicycle, living simply and intimately. But just as important, and more accessible for many parents, were the opportunities for learning closer to home.

In this special presentation, Cindy will share how the Blue Mountain, the Schuylkill River, Hawk Mountain Sanctuary and the many programs and opportunities found here in her "back yard" of Schuylkill County inspired and educated her children. These adventures brought intangible gifts: values such as compassion, self-reliance and appreciation that are crucially important to anyone but especially when raising children.

Cindy will share an inspiring multi-media show followed by a lively Q&A. Autographed books will be available. This program is co-sponsored by Schuylkill Headwaters Association, Schuylkill County Conservancy, and the Schuylkill Conservation District with help from Penn State University. 

- Saturday, September 22nd, 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m., "The Pinnacle". Gorgeous views from the top of Blue Mountain. Meet Robin Tracey in the State Game Lands parking lot off Rte. 61 south near Port Clinton to carpool. You must register for this walk by calling Robin at 570-467-2506. Bring a lunch. No dogs please. (11 miles, difficult)
- Saturday, October 6th, 10:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m., "Lebanon Reservoir and Swatara Furnace". Robin Tracey leads you on this historic and scenic tour. Meet at the concrete pad at State Game Lands off Gold Mine Road. See a large reservoir and follow the old railbed and then drive to the Swatara Furnace. Bring lunch and dogs are welcome. (7 miles, moderate)
- Sunday, October 7th, 1:00-4:00 p.m., "Walk in Penn's Woods—Tuscarora State Park". Walk in Penn's Woods aims to get people out to enjoy the woods and to learn about how these woods work for us - from recreation and wildlife habitat to seeing the outcomes of timber harvests. Last year every county in PA hosted this kind of walk and this year is no exception. Meet at the office of Tuscarora State Park. Open to all ages. (2 miles, moderate)
- Sunday, October 14th, 8:00 a.m.-1:30 p.m., "County View". "Hiker Jim" offers plenty to see including the "88" and diversion canal plus "The Old Jerk" and a spectacular view of County Schuylkill. Meet behind Mt. Pleasant Hose Company in Buck Run on Rte. 901. (8.4 miles, easy)
- Sunday, October 21st, 1:00-4:00 p.m., "Peddler's Grave". Visit the site of the first murder in our area along a turnpike from the late 1700's. Meet in the parking lot for the Coal Miner's Memorial on the north side of Shenandoah for carpool to the trailhead. (5 miles, moderate)
- Sunday, November 4th, 8:00 a.m.-1:30 p.m., "Dyer Run Gorge". "Hiker Jim" leads you on this Gorge Trail that was re-opened in 2014. Walk in a wilderness area then downhill on "Stephen's Road." Meet at 806 Valley Road in Pine Knot. (7 miles, moderate)
- Sunday, November 4th, 1:00-3:00 p.m., "Bartram Trail North Stretch". Some nature, some history on this trail section. Meet at the Auburn Trailhead on Rte. 895 just before the river to travel to hike start location. (4 miles, easy)
- Saturday, December 1st, 10:00-11:00 a.m., "Sweet Arrow Sojourn". "Porcupine Pat" leads us on a different path for a jaunt around the park that includes some nice scenes of the water. Meet at the Waterfall Road parking lot of Sweet Arrow Lake County Park. (3 miles, easy)



What state and local mosquito control programs do



Why is local mosquito control important?

Some mosquitoes can spread viruses like Zika, West Nile, and dengue. Other mosquitoes bother people, but don't spread viruses. Mosquito control activities reduce all types of mosquitoes.

Who conducts mosquito control?

Mosquito control districts or state and local government departments work to control mosquitoes.

What do local mosquito control programs do?

Educate

Teach the public about mosquito control practices

Conduct surveillance

Track mosquito populations and viruses they may be carrying

Kill larvae

Treat water that cannot be covered or removed with larvicides

Study mosquitoes

Determine if EPA-registered insecticides are effective

Kill adult mosquitoes

Spray adulticides when mosquitoes are most active

Remove standing water

Reduce areas where mosquitoes lay eggs that hatch into larvae

Each year diseases transmitted by mosquitoes (such as malaria, yellow fever, dengue and filarial worms) kill or debilitate millions of people, mostly in developing countries located in tropical areas.

An Expedition to Inspire Watershed Action



Schuylkill Acts & Impacts is an experiential environmental education journey for high school students along the 120-mile Schuylkill River from its headwaters in the coal lands of Schuylkill County to its confluence with the Delaware River in Philadelphia. Team leaders from Schuylkill Headwaters Association, Fairmount Water Works, and Take It Outdoors Adventures guided students down the river, and presenters offered guided tours and programming designed to highlight issues in the Schuylkill River Watershed and explore hands-on solutions to these problems. Stroud Water Research Center educators assisted throughout the week with water quality sampling and analysis, adding a very valuable component to the program.

A total of 10 students participated in Schuylkill Acts & Impacts 2018 the week of June 16-23, representing all of the counties along the Schuylkill River. Additionally, two students from previous years accompanied the group to assist staff with activities and share their experiences and insights with the new students.

After traveling the length of the river, students became aware of how easy it is to impact the quality of the river and how much communities and cities like Philadelphia depend on people upstream to keep the water safe and clean.

One student said, "It has been so fun to be on this trip. I hope I have the amazing opportunity to do this again. It made me realize how much of an impact we (humans) make on the watershed. I want to help with this any way I can. It is so amazing!!!"

Fall is here...now what for your garden? By Tom Reed

Several things are still required to put the garden to bed before the snow flies. These are common practices whether you are growing flowers, vegetables, perennials,

- 1. If you have not soil tested in the last 3 to 5 years, test your soil. Soil Test Kits are available at the Extension Office. The results will tell you if and how much lime or sulfur and other amendments to apply to the soil to maintain your garden.
- 2. Prior to putting in a new planting, such as blueberries, soil test. Blueberries require a soil pH of 4.5 to 5.5. Our soils are usually 6.0 and above, so amendment must be made to get the proper pH.
- 3. Remove and destroy diseased or insect infested annuals to prevent spreading into next year's plants.
- 4. Plant cover crops or mulch bare soil to prevent soil erosion during winter.
- 5. If you are putting manure on the garden beds, do so before the ground freezes.
- 6. Plant your garlic around Columbus Day for harvest next summer.
- 7. Did I mention "don't guess soil test" before you make amendments with your soil!!

Master Gardener Basic Training—Schuylkill County

Penn State Master Gardeners of Schuylkill County recruit and train new volunteers every other year. Next enrollment begins March 2019 with training for selected applicants starting in September 2019.
