#### To benefit Sweet Arrow Lake County Park

Your seedlings will increase property value, enhance wildlife habitat, beautify the landscape, improve the environment, and can provide a source of income. The Sweet Arrow Lake Conservation Association (SALCA) and the Schuylkill Conservation District work together to make this sale possible. Your support for Sweet Arrow Lake is appreciated!

- CONCOLOR FIR: Extremely popular tree in past sales. Excellent ornamental or Christmas tree.
   Has flat, soft green to deep blue citrus-scented needles. Hardy because it withstands dry periods and high temperatures. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 5-10."
- NORWAY SPRUCE: Fastest growing of all spruces. Develops pyramidal shape and strong graceful branches that are covered with dark green needles. Ideal windbreaker that likes full sun and grows in various soils. Matures at 60 feet and has a beautiful 25 foot spread. 4 year old seedlings. Size: 7-14."
- EASTERN WHITE PINE: Great ornamental or Christmas tree with soft, long blue-green needles. Excellent for wildlife cover. Likes ordinary soil, average moisture, and full sun. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 5-10."
- RED OAK: Very popular landscaping tree for shade on lawns, parks and golf courses. This oak
  is fast growing and easy to transplant. It is tolerant of urban conditions including dry and acidic soil and
  has abundant acorns that attract wildlife. Leaves turn a brilliant brick-red fall color and adds color to a
  forest. This tree has been used in mine reclamation sites for revegetation purposes. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 8-18."
- SARGENT CRABAPPLE: Fragrant, single red buds open white amid green, deeply lobed foliage.
   Bright red fruit follows later in the season and persists into the winter. Attracts birds. A mounding, wide-spreading dwarf-size tree that fits well into most landscapes. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 12-24."
- ARROWWOOD VIBURNUM: Arrowwood Viburnum is a flowering shrub that bears white flowers
  in spring and attractive fall foliage and clustered bluish-berries in fall. It reaches a height of 6'-15', with a
  similar spread. These shrubs are amazingly versatile and tolerate a range of soils, including wet soils.
  They can be grown in full sun, partial shade or full shade. Good for butterflies and wild birds for cover
  and food. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 10-24."
- SILKY DOGWOOD: Deciduous spreading shrub. Multi-stemmed shrub with dense foliage and rounded form. New stems are reddish purple with fine silky hair. Flexible stems will root where they are in contact with the ground. Clusters of small white flowers in spring, followed by blue berries which ripen to black. Flowers attract butterflies. Fruit eaten by many birds. Leaves and twigs browsed by deer and rabbits. One of the more shade tolerant shrubs for moist soil. Used for restoration and ground stabilization because of its ability to readily root from stems. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 15"-30."
- AMERICAN CRANBERRY: Excellent deciduous shrub for screening up to 10 to 12 feet high. It
  grows to a width of 8 feet with very dense growth of up to 3 feet per year in full sun or part shade. This
  bush has showy white flowers in spring followed by red berries in fall and winter. Berries hang through
  mid winter making excellent bird feed. This shrub has very few insect problems and prefers good, welldrained soil. For best growth, provide supplemental water during dry periods. For a solid screen, plant
  bushes 2 to 3 feet apart. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 15-30."

### You Can Make a Difference!

Rain water runs across the land and picks up fertilizers, manure, litter, soil and more sending it into nearby streams and lakes. Our everyday actions—from fertilizing our lawns to walking our dogs—impacts on the health of waterways. Learn how to reduce localized flooding, restore and protect waterways and protect our invaluable drinking water sources.

### **Take Action at Home**

- Apply compost and use fertilizers sparingly
- Pick up pet waste when walking your dog
- Uses rain barrels to collect rainwater from your roof
- Reduce pesticide use and use safer alternatives
- Conserve water outdoors by using soaker hoses rather than sprinklers
- Look for the WaterSense logo when purchasing water efficient appliances and products
- Walk, bike, carpool or use public transit

### Take Action on the Farm

- Plant native trees and shrubs along rivers and streams
- · Installs streambank fencing to keep livestock out of streams
- Provides watering facility for livestock
- Practice no-till farming
- Uses crop rotation and cover crops
- Has up to date conservation and nutrient management plans
- Utilizes manure storage and doesn't apply manure onto frozen ground

### **Take Action in Communities**

- Installs vegetated green roofs and walls
- Uses pervious pavement allowing water to infiltrate the ground
- Collect rain water from rooftops in rain barrels or cisterns
- Create a rain garden to collect runoff from roofs, walkways and parking lots
- Install a tree trench system or storm water bump out to water trees and plants while managing runoff
- Develop a storm water planter in the sidewalk area to manage street and sidewalk runoff
- Use other stormwater best management practices





### Test your soil to provide optimum fertilization for your garden by Tom Reed

Spring is in the air, at least we hope it is. 2018 was a tough growing season and so far, it looks like we are starting a bit late this season.

If you didn't soil test this past fall, I would strongly recommend a soil test for your garden for this year. We saw record rainfall last year and, in some areas, flooding that could contribute to pH and/or fertility problems in your lawn and gar-

Soil test kits are available at the Penn State Extension Office for \$9.00. The recommendations from the soil test will provide valuable information as to what your soil requires and will provide recommendation for the optimum amounts of fertilizer. This is cost effective for you and prevents over fertilizing which is not good for our watersheds.






### Master Gardeners get new coordinator
