

Penn State Extension and Pennsylvania 4-H Unveil New Stormwater Education Curriculum, Rain to Drain – Slow the Flow

Rain to Drain – Slow the Flow is a fun and hands-on curriculum designed to teach about the movement of stormwater through natural, developed, and green communities. Concepts covered in the curriculum include runoff and infiltration, impervious surfaces, green infrastructure, human impacts on the environment, flooding, groundwater, forces and the science of motion, and more.


Rain to Drain – Slow the Flow was written with middle school aged youth in mind, but is easily adaptable to younger and older audiences – including the general public. Adaptations for quick demonstrations using the **Rain to Drain** model at community events and fairs are possible .


Rain to Drain – Slow the Flow is an inquiry-based science experiment when completed in its entirety. The whole curriculum could be used as a week-long or multi-week module or sections can be completed as independent lessons.

Rain to Drain – Slow the Flow is currently available as a FREE online download. The materials needed to complete the activity with up to 20 participants were specifically chosen to cost you less than \$20, and they are readily available in typical grocery and craft stores.


- **TIMELINE:** Contest runs from February 1 to April 6, 2016. Photos must have been taken between January 1, 2015 and April 6, 2016.



Avian Influenza

Avian influenza (AI), commonly known as “bird flu,” is caused by an influenza type A virus. Avian influenza viruses occur naturally in birds. Wild bird species (such as ducks, swans and geese) can carry the viruses but usually do not get sick from them. However, avian influenza in birds is very contagious and can make some domesticated birds (chickens, ducks, quail, pheasants, guinea fowl and turkeys) very sick or even cause death.

Avian influenza viruses do not usually infect humans, but certain strains of AI have the potential to infect people and are referred to as “zoonotic.” If a highly pathogenic or zoonotic AI strain enters the United States, it could have serious economic and health impacts on the poultry industry and public health.

Current Status in Pennsylvania

No highly pathogenic Avian Influenza viruses have been detected in Pennsylvania since the 1983-84 outbreaks.

Species Affected: Chickens, turkeys, quail, pheasants, ostriches, geese, swans, any feathered animal.

Prevention

Biosecurity is most important for anyone who owns or works with poultry – whether on a commercial farm, in the wild, or at a hobby/backyard farm. You should take proper steps to keep HPAI from spreading. The best way to protect your birds is to follow good biosecurity.

- Keep your distance.
- Keep it clean.
- Don't haul disease home.
- Don't borrow disease from your neighbor.
- Know the warning signs of infectious bird diseases.

Report sick birds.

Two very active committees of the Schuylkill County Conservancy collaborated to organize a popular woodland workshop. Called "Woods in Your Backyard" the workshop was geared mostly to the small woodlot owner of ten acres or less. Both the Community Forestry and the Forestry committees worked with Penn State Master Gardeners, Penn State-Schuylkill, and DCNR-Bureau of Forestry to make the program possible. About 80 participants registered and were treated to a variety of speakers that featured Dr. Jim Finley of Penn State main campus who is one of the authors of the manual that was given to participants as part of their registration. Many left brimming with ideas to enhance habitat and look at their woodlot in a new way!

Your quality seedlings will increase property value, enhance wildlife habitat, beautify the landscape, improve the environment, and can provide a source of income. Proceeds benefit programs at Sweet Arrow Lake County Park. The Sweet Arrow Lake Conservation Association (SALCA) and the Schuylkill Conservation District work together on this sale. **Your support is greatly appreciated!**

- **CONCOLOR FIR:** Extremely popular tree in past sales. Excellent ornamental or Christmas tree. Has flat, soft green to deep blue citrus-scented needles. Hardy because it withstands dry periods and high temperatures. 4 year old seedlings. Size: 8-16."
- **NORWAY SPRUCE:** Fastest growing of the spruces. Develops pyramidal shape and strong graceful branches that are covered with dark green needles. Ideal windbreaker that likes full sun and grows in various soils. Matures at 60 feet and has a beautiful 25 foot spread. 4 year old seedlings. Size: 10-24."
- **BLACK HILLS SPRUCE:** Desirable, symmetrical cone shape to this conifer. Dense bright-green needles mature to an interesting blue-green. Great landscape accent, useful as windbreak or screening. Browsed by mammals and attracts birds. Serves as a good yard or ornamental tree either solo or in a group. 5 year old seedlings. Size: 10-24."
- **AUSTRIAN PINE:** This is an extremely tolerant pine of adverse soil conditions. This stately tree can be seen in parks, along streets, in residential landscapes, and as farm windbreaks throughout much of the United States. Landscapers use the dark beauty of these trees for backdrops, but it is also an excellent specimen tree because of its leaf pattern. Can grow up to 60 feet high with a 20-40 foot spread. 4 year old seedlings. Size: 10-28."
- **AMERICAN ARBORVITAE:** This slow-growing tree prefers full sun to partial shade but adapts to a variety of soil conditions. Prefers moist soils but can withstand drought. It grows to a mature height of 25-40 feet, and has a mature spread of 10-15 feet. Makes a good wind-block and provides cover for all types of wildlife year round. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 6-12."
- **RED MAPLE:** This maple grows at a moderate to rapid rate and does best in bright sun to partial shade. It will grow in a range of soil types from sandy loam to clay. Better soil will result in a better healthier tree. The tree has a pyramidal shape when young. When tree matures it will attain a larger more rounded crown and will grow to a size of 40-60 feet with a width of 25-45 feet. Leaves turn a brilliant red during fall and accent any yard. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 5-10."
- **RED OAK:** Very popular landscaping tree for shade on lawns, parks and golf courses. This oak is fast growing and easy to transplant. It is tolerant of urban conditions including dry and acidic soil and has abundant acorns that attract wildlife. Leaves turn a brilliant brick-red fall color and adds color to a forest. This tree has been used in mine reclamation sites for revegetation purposes. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 10-24."
- **TULIP POPLAR:** This tree is considered both a shade tree and an ornamental tree. It features a spreading canopy capable of blocking sunlight and adds visual interest and beauty to landscaping. It is the tallest of the eastern hardwoods—and a rapid grower when conditions are right. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 10-28."
- **AMERICAN CRANBERRY:** *Popular seedling the last three years!* This is an excellent deciduous shrub for screening up to 10 to 12 feet high. It grows to a width of 8 feet with very dense growth of up to 3 feet per year in full sun or part shade. This bush has showy white flowers in spring followed by red berries in fall and winter. Berries hang through mid-winter making excellent bird feed. This shrub has very few insect problems and prefers good, well-drained soil. For best growth, provide supplemental water during dry periods. For a solid screen, plant bushes 2 to 3 feet apart. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 10-22."
- **FORSYTHIA:** Beautiful yellow-flowered shrub that is fast-growing to about seven feet tall. Tolerates poor soil and city conditions. Good for screens and hedges and cover for birds and small wildlife. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 10-24."
- **WINTERBERRY:** Winterberry is a deciduous shrub growing to 6-15 feet tall and often as wide. It develops a rounded habit through suckering, eventually growing into a sizeable colony of upright stems. The stems tend to be dark brown and often develop a pleasing gray sheen. The 3 inch long, elliptic, toothed, and pointed leaves vary from light to dark green, taking a yellow hue in autumn. Insignificant flowers appear in May – June and are followed by bright red berries in late summer. The berries, for which the common name was derived, remain after leaf fall and persist into the winter months to provide food for wildlife. Winterberry prefers evenly moist, acid soils in full sun to partial shade. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 8-18."
- **COMMON LILAC:** A medium to large hardy shrub with stout, spreading branches developing an oval to irregularly-rounded crown. The showy flowers are fragrant and enjoyed each spring. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 10-20."




Penn State Extension sponsors Rain Barrel Make 'N Take

Spring is a time to divide certain perennials plants

PREPARING TO DIVIDE PERENNIALS

Plants that are to be divided should be well watered a day or two before. Prepare an area where you plan to place the new divisions. Cut back stems and foliage to 6 inches from the ground. Pry underneath the plant with a tool and lift the whole clump.



Fountain Grass Purple

Spreading root systems with matted roots, such as grasses and tickseed, can be pulled apart by hand or cut apart with a sharp knife. Make individual clumps with three to five shoots.



Bee Balm

Plants that have clumping root systems such as daylilies and hosta can be divided by cutting through the crown with a heavy, sharp knife.
