Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area hosts the PA Game Commission's Visitor Center located near the point where Lancaster and Lebanon counties meet. The site is less than an hour from Pottsville and offers a variety of free programs throughout the year. Middle Creek is renowned for being a stopover for migrating snow geese and swans. While birding at the site this winter be sure to check out this program: Saturday, February 24th at 10:00 AM: On the Search for Silk Moth Cocoons Most parks, rail trails, and other public areas

have moth cocoons hiding within variable habitat. Learning how to find them can be a ton of fun and in most cases, requires minimal effort. This event will start with a quick discussion about local silk moth species and the cocoons in which they hibernate. Then we'll take the group on a hike, in order to help teach everyone how to find cocoons. Host plant, habitat, geography, time of day, and identifying moths to specific habitat will be the focus of the day. Actually finding cocoons will be a huge bonus!

49th Annual Seedling Sale



To benefit Sweet Arrow Lake County Park

Your seedlings will increase property value, enhance wildlife habitat, beautify the landscape, improve the environment, and can provide a source of income. *Thanks for your support of the lake!*

- **EASTERN WHITE PINE:** Great ornamental or Christmas tree with soft, long blue-green needles. Excellent for wild-life cover. Likes ordinary soil, average moisture, and full sun. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 5-10"
- **NORWAY SPRUCE:** Fastest growing of all spruces. Develops pyramidal shape and strong graceful branches that are covered with dark green needles. Ideal windbreaker that likes full sun and grows in various soils. Matures at 60 feet and has a beautiful 25 foot spread. 4 year old seedlings. Size: 1-2 ft.
- **EASTERN REDCEDAR:** Pyramidal evergreen growing up to 50 feet. Medium green needles are flat and scale-like. Grayish to reddish brown bark is considered part of its ornamental interest. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 3-6."
- RIVER BIRCH: Native tree to Pennsylvania that is popular for its ornamental peeling bark. As a landscape plant, it is grown as a single-stem tree or in a clump as a multi-stemmed tree with three or more trunks. It transplants easily and grows quickly in a wide variety of soils. Can grow to over 50 feet tall. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 4-8."
- CATALPA: Catalpas have large attractive leaves and are generally deciduous. The showy flowers are white, yellowish, or purplish and are popular with bees and hummingbirds. The fruit is a long cylindrical pod bearing numerous seeds with white tufts of hair at each end. Grows to 40 to 60 feet tall. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 1-2 ft.
- SUGAR MAPLE: A landscape standout! Medium to dark-green leaves turn a spectacular yellow, burnt orange or
 red in fall. Tolerates shade, likes a well-drained, moderately moist, fertile soil. Grows to 60' to 75', 40'-50' spread.
 Future generations will thank you as they pour delicious home-made maple syrup tapped from your trees onto pancakes! 2 year old seedlings. Size: 6-12."
- WASHINGTON HAWTHORN: A deciduous tree in the Roseaceae (rose) family is noted for its attractive flowers
 and foliage, bright red fruits long straight thoms, and fall color. It is a small, low-branching, deciduous tree that typically grows 25 to 30 feet tall with a rounded crown. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 4-8."
- **SWAMP WHITE OAK:** Swamp white oak produces a large crop of acoms every 3-5 years, with lighter crops produced in the off years. Its bark is light brown or gray, becoming darker brown with age and is deeply fissured and flaky when mature. This tree is a great choice for a shade or street tree, with the ability to grow at a moderate pace and live more than 300 years. It's the kind of tree you plant for not only your enjoyment but for the benefit of generations to come. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 12-24."
- **RED BUD:** Red Bud grows as a small tree with an abundance of purple blossoms in the spring. It has large heart shaped leaves during the summer, and long seed pods in the fall. 3 year old seedlings. Size: 12-24."
- **PIN OAK:** Named for a characteristic where small, thin, dead branches stick out like pins from the main trunk. This is among the most widely planted and fastest-growing native oaks. It tolerates drought, poor soils and is easy to transplant. Popular because of an attractive shape and trunk. The green, glossy leaves show brilliant red to bronze fall color. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 12-24."
- BLACK CHOKEBERRY SHRUB: A deciduous shrub that features white flowers, black fruits and bold red fall foliage. Can be planted in either full sun or partial shade. You will get the best flowering and fruiting in full sun locations. The fruit can be canned whole or the juice extracted for jelly making as well as a healthful fruit drink. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 5-10."
- **BUTTONBUSH:** Buttonbush is an easy-to-recognize bush that grows in water or moist soil. It is easy to identify because of its beautiful flowers and fruits. A good plant for slopes and accent your butterfly garden. It can also be seen in marshes, and bordering streams, ponds, and lakes. They also grow in wet woods, thickets, and ditches. It can grow up to 15 feet tall, but is usually much shorter (few feet). Its leaves are usually between three and six inches long, and are shiny, dark green and pointed. 2 year old seedlings. Size: 5-10."

"From the Greenhouse Column" by Master Gardener Tom Reed

It is wintertime and thoughts of seedlings and planting seem far away, especially with sunrise at 7:24 am and sunset around 4:30 pm. Temperatures are a bit frosty, too.

For those who follow the USDA Plant Hardiness Zone in determining last and first frost dates, there has been a change. Most of Schuylkill County has been in 6B and 6A. That has changed too, most of our area is now 7A and northern Schuylkill County is 6B. Always remember, soil temperature and night air temperatures are important when planting (direct seeding or transplants) no matter what the calendar says.

Check the catalog or seed packets for germination or planting temperatures!

The other item at this time of the year is the arrival of all the seed catalogs with photos of the most perfect veggies, fruits, and flowers. Once you go through a catalog, it removes any doubt about whether you are gardening again in 2024! Your order for seeds and plants are in before the end of January!

Also, there are new gardening tools that you must have to make the garden perfect.

In many years of gardening, I have found out the new tool this year is next year's yard sale item, and it is back to the old reliable ones.



The Master Gardeners will be doing the Spring Series event on Saturday, March 2 this year. That day (9:00AM – 3:00 PM) there will presentations on five different gardening topics (Crop rotation and new vegetable cultivars, seed starting for the home gardener, propagation, Monarchs and milkweed, and the growing and care of houseplants). Registration will begin in January through Penn State's CVENT program. Hope to see you there!

Plan your garden over winter:

What you'd like to grow, where you'd like to put it, and when you need to sow seeds. Browse seed catalogs and Instagram for ideas. Use a garden journal or online planner if you'd like, but organizing now will keep you on track in the summer. It's armchair gardening at its best and the perfect winter gardening task for days when it's just too cold, windy, or snowy to want to venture outdoors. This is one of those winter gardening ideas that you'll truly enjoy!
